



January 29: Arrival

You will be met at Cairo International Airport by a meet-and-assist agent, who will help you through customs and arrivals, and then escort you to the Cairo Marriott in Zamalek, both a hotel and an historic, 19th century palace. Relax and get settled in for the evening, or explore on your own.

January 30: Saqqara and Dahshur

Visit the Old Kingdom sites of Saqqara and Dahshur, taking in the original pyramids that inspired the world-famous Giza ones you will see tomorrow. Relax and get settled in that evening, or explore the island of Zamalek, full of tons of local shops, restaurants, bars, and cafes.




January 31: Giza and the GEM

Visit the Pyramids and the Sphinx, with the option to enter the Great Pyramid, exploring the inner burial chamber (extra ticket, approximately \$30). Then visit the Grand Egyptian Museum, the largest archaeological museum in the world (not currently fully open, but hopefully it will be by our trip).

February 1: Luxor and Embarkation

After an early morning flight to Luxor (leaving CAI around 6am), visit Karnak Temple, the largest ancient Egyptian temple complex, with its breathtaking Hypostyle Hall containing 134 gargantuan columns. Check into Nun Goddess Dahabiya, our private yacht on the Nile River, and explore Luxor Temple that evening.

February 2: Luxor's West Bank

After an optional sunrise Hot Air Balloon ride (\$120 per person) to see Luxor's ancient monuments and the Nile River from up high, visit the Valley of the Kings (including extra tickets to see the tombs of Tutankhamun and Ramses V and VI), Hatshepsut's Mortuary Temple, and the Colossi of Memnon. Enjoy lunch while starting our journey south on the Nile River.

February 3: Edfu Temple

Our Nile Cruise on our privately-chartered Dahabiya Yacht is all about relaxing and enjoying the journey, and today we will cruise south, and visit the best preserved ancient Egyptian temple, Edfu Temple, dedicated to the god Horus.

February 4: Cruising the Nile

In between savoring the beauty and tranquility of the Nile River, explore Gebel el Silsileh, an ancient rock quarry with many shrines, and take in Kom Ombo Temple, directly on the Nile River, dedicated to two gods: the crocodile god, Sobek, and the falcon god, Horus. Arrive in Aswan that evening and dock just north of the city.

February 5: Abu Simbel

With a very early morning wakeup, visit Abu Simbel Temple by private vehicle, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and ancient temple that was moved piece by piece to save it from being flooded after the Aswan High Dam's construction created the giant reservoir of Lake Nasser. After taking in Ramses the Great's masterpiece, return to Aswan, and take an optional afternoon exploring the city's bustling souq (market).

February 6: Aswan

Visit the Aswan High Dam and learn how this modern engineering marvel changed Egypt forever, and take a boat to visit Philae Temple, the only temple we will see that is on its own island. That evening, fly from Aswan back to Cairo, and check back into the Cairo Marriott Hotel.

February 7: Explore more of Cairo!

Visit the Cairo Citadel, containing the impressive Alabaster Mosque of Muhammed Ali, then visit Coptic Cairo and the UNESCO World Heritage site of El Moez Street, with 1,000 years of Islamic architecture and history. Shop in the Khan el Khalilii Souq (market) that is part of this historic neighborhood for some last-minute souvenirs.

February 8: Cairo Museums

Spend a relaxed day visiting two of Egypt's best museums, the original Egyptian Museum in Tahrir Square, and the National Museum of Egyptian Civilization. A delicious lunch of Egyptian *koshary* (a must-try Egyptian dish!) will provide a great break in between the museums. That evening head out to an (optional) posh dinner on a boat in the Nile River.
